

President's Message

Steve Walker

Here's hoping that 2025 has been a good year for you all so far. It's certainly has started of with a bang for the Buckeye Trail Association. Before the end of 2024, we were notified by the NPS Buckeye National Scenic Trail Feasibility Study Team that their Public Meetings were going to happen in January along with the Public Comment period. Those Public Meetings took place from January 13th through the 15th along with a virtual one on January 23rd. Because of our efforts to rally the BTA Community, approximately 400 people in total attended these six meetings in spite of the cold weather. The Public Comment period ended on February 19th and I feel safe in presuming that the BTA Community has also responded in good numbers for that. The Feasibility Study Team now has a lot of the data that will help them to prepare a report to the U.S. Congress next year as to the feasibility and suitability of the Buckeye Trail to become a National Scenic Trail.

Next Big Steps:

With that out of the way, we now have to begin the next segment along the path to having our favorite trail become the nation's twelfth National Scenic Trail. This next phase, which has now begun, will be the Buckeye National Scenic Trail Advocacy Campaign and it will last at least 22 months, if not longer.

Public Awareness and Advocacy:

We'll be starting to build the grassroots organization among

BTA Members and branching out to our partners and supporters. Some BTA Chapters have already signaled their willingness to set up a local Chapter advocacy committee. Even as that organizational effort is getting started, we can begin making the public aware of our quest for National Scenic Trail status. That can be via social media or word of mouth whenever you're out on the trail or in any public setting. The BTA National Scenic Trail Comms Team, an ad hoc committee created in December, has been working on the message and figuring out how you can share it with your fellow Ohioans.

Advocacy Goal:

Concurrent with this program to inform all Ohioans will be a similar effort to engage with our elected officials to secure their support for NST status for the Buckeye Trail. This will be ongoing and regular. The local Chapter advocacy committees will want to begin reaching out to local city and village councilpersons and mayors, township trustees and county commissioners as well as state legislators and officials. We already have the support of Governor Mike DeWine. State Senators and State Representatives will be the ones that we will want to focus on for the early part of this advocacy campaign. Even though the Ohio General Assembly will not be the decider on this designation, its support will be influential with U.S. Senators and Congressmen.

Our seventeen U.S. Senators and Congressmen will be the most important ones to convince. Once we convince them that the Buckeye Trail deserves National Scenic Trail status, at least half of the nation's remaining 518 federal legislators will have to be convinced as well. We may have to help them with this.

Benefits of National Scenic Trail Status:

There are many advantages to becoming a National Scenic Trail. Recognition and resources are just two of them. Those advantages will need to be conveyed to everyone who would support this effort. As mentioned above, the BTA NST Comms Team will be developing resources to assist those of you who want to help advocate for NST status. If you think that you would like to help with this advocacy campaign, please let me know. My email address is below. On the Trail....

Walk with me for a little down a virtual brand-new segment of the Buckeye Trail.



We parked on the gravel at the trailhead and notice license plates from all over the place, and many with Buckeye Trail stickers intermixed with other great adventures from around the country. Some cars have 'I am working on the BT' signs in their windows. We're looking over a new kiosk with a map of the local trail network, and a big map of the entire BT winding its way around the state. We hit the trail.



There's a fiberglass carsonite post with a BT sticker being installed by a BTA volunteer. I remember making the order for the posts recently... and I also recall when we got the post driver from the National Park Service – NCNST several years ago. The blue blazes on trees look freshly painted, and... I notice a new layer of blue on the hands and clothes of a couple more volunteers ahead. We keep walking past

the smiling faces and ask if way may pass two volunteers finishing the trail tread with McLeods. And, then again, after stepping around

a broken Pulaski handle, we give four more volunteers a break from benching a level tread out of the hillside, removing small saplings by the root as they go. While they stop to rest at a side trail intersection,

the root as they go. while they stop to take a drink, and enjoy their 10 o'clock break, we move on toward whirring noises around the nose of the hillside. There's not really a trail any more to walk on, just a scraped blown out path through the woods with hanging ribbon tape decorating branches along the centerline of the BT to be.



Walking around the bend, two more volunteers are scraping the forest floor with fire rakes while another volunteer with the backpack leaf blower noisily blasts the leaf layer off up ahead. Across the stream valley we can see, in bright orange, a BTA chainsawyer and swamper bucking one more fallen tree off the new trails path before their well-deserved break.



I wonder if they'll make it all the way out to the next road today, or tomorrow. What do you think?

Let's turn round, on our way back, let's take that side trail back to the designated Buckeye Trail Town for lunch. On our way back I can't help but think about the next steps for this segment of the BT. We'll be processing all these volunteer hours, reporting the hours to partners, acknowledging and awarding volunteers. We'll be GPSing, mapping, and publishing this new gift for everyone to enjoy. We'll have to let people know about it through our printed, electronic, and social media. We'll have to recruit, train, and support new trail adopters to make sure this piece of the BT is maintained in good condition... forever. We need another DR brush mower! And, what about that next parcel of land across the road up ahead, how are those conversations with the landowner/manager going?

Breaking it all down:

It's been estimated that a mile of BT takes +/- 500 hours to plan and build. I feel that is an extremely conservative number when you include all of the required relationship building, the project proposing and reviewing, the adjustments to avoid a sensitive plant community, the land owner/manager agreements, the permitting from ODNR, State Historic Preservation Office, and/or Army Corps of Engineers, the recruitment, training, organizing and retention of skilled volunteers, and documentation and marketing of a new product. Turns out, creating access to Ohio's Great Outdoors is a lot of work!

While costly and time consuming, with everyone's help; BTA members, donors, volunteers, staff, and partners, we're able to invest in things that last beyond just this one virtual work party. We'll fix and use those Pulaski's and foster those relationships on other great projects for years to come. Our combined investments of ideas, relationships, skills, time, and money produce something of even greater value. The value of walking out a fresh mile of the BT with volunteers over a job well done... meeting a family of hikers ready to hike a brand-new segment of our Buckeye Trail.... Priceless.

Imagine if we had even more volunteers and support staff



time, more projects shovel ready, more materials and equipment, training and PPE, BWC coverage for all BTA volunteers, a larger audience engaged to promote Ohio's BT to, more and better Trail Towns and trailheads. More investments in the idea of the Buckeye Trail in all the ways touched on above are all targeted on providing more miles of the BT off roads through Ohio's greatest landscapes for that family to enjoy towards their goal of completing an adventure of a lifetime, all around Ohio.

Besides the acknowledgement of the BTA's accomplishments and the promotional value for Ohio's greatest outdoor experience, the potential investment in expanding and improving the BT experience is why the BTA is interested in National Scenic Trail designation for our trail. In 1958 Merril Gilfillan wrote in the Columbus Dispatch Magazine that the Buckeye Trail "should be as endless and as boundless as the energy and the imagination of those who would use it."

Thank you for virtually hiking a mile of fresh BT with me and for supporting the work of the Buckeye Trail Association. I hope to see you on the trail this Spring... for real.

Navigate the BTA: A Beginner's Guide to Exploring and Contributing

New to the BT, or the BTA? Confused how to navigate the complex organism that is the greater Buckeye Trail Association? This guide is designed to help you navigate the complexities of the BTA and discover ways to contribute to the preservation and enhancement of the Buckeye Trail, both on and off the trail.

To start this off, maybe using the initials BT and BTA just might be confusing, it is to us at times. When we talk about BT, we're referring to the actual beloved Buckeye Trail, being the thing we're all here for. On the other hand, the BTA, or the Buckeye Trail Association, is the group of passionate individuals who take care of, maintain, and preserve the BT.



The Buckeye Trail:

First imagined in the late 1950s, the Buckeye Trail was initially envisioned as a path connecting the Ohio River to Lake Erie. Over the years, it has become a sprawling 1,400+mile loop, comprised of 26 sections (See the Chapter Map above.), showcasing everything from serene lakeshores to bustling urban landscapes. It can be easy for one to become engulfed in the trail's rich and amazing history, with its winding paths through every corner of Ohio, as you grow your appreciation for the beauty that countless volunteers have helped to preserve.

The Buckeye Trail Association: Be Part of Something Bigger:

The BTA is a passionate community of volunteers who maintain and promote the Buckeye Trail. More than just an organization, the BTA offers social events, workshops, and hikes that foster camaraderie among members. By joining, you'll contribute to the maintenance and improvement of one of America's longest and most diverse trails.

Chapters:

First and foremost the most important people with the greater BTA are the dedicated volunteers of our ten Chapters (See the

The members of the BTA's committees are a vibrant network of passionate individuals dedicated to maintaining and promoting the BT. At the heart of these committees are its members, each playing a crucial role in ensuring the trail's success and sustainability. Awards & Recognition Committee:

They identify and celebrate the outstanding contributions of volunteers, recognizing the individuals who support the trail's mission with dedication and passion.

Board Resource Committee:

This group is responsible for providing resources and support to the BTA Board of Trustees. Their primary function is to ensure that the board has the necessary tools and information to lead effectively. Additionally, they handle nominations and elections to the BTA Board of Trustees.

Development Committee:

This committee is focused on expanding the Buckeye Trail's reach and influence. They work on helping to secure funding and partnerships to support trail development projects, ensuring that the trail remains a vital part of Ohio's outdoor recreation landscape.

Finance Committee:

Managing the financial health of the BTA, this committee handles budgeting, and financial planning to ensure the continued operation and preservation of the Association.

Membership Committee:

This committee focuses on growing the Association's membership base, ensuring that a diverse group of people are connected with the Buckeye Trail. They work to engage both new and existing members, fostering a community committed to the trail's mission.

Scholarship Fund Committee:

This committee handles the scholarship program, seeking qualified applicants and helping to further educational opportunities. They support the next generation of trail enthusiasts by promoting and managing The BTA Scholarship. *Trail Preservation Committee:*

Charged with preserving a permanent corridor for the BT, this team works to protect the trail and its surrounding lands. They collaborate with conservation partners to ensure longterm trail sustainability and protection against incompatible uses.



Trail Promotion Committee:

Focused on promoting the Buckeye Trail, this committee works on publicity through social media, the BTA website, newsletters, and special events like Buckeye TrailFest. They play a vital role in raising awareness and encouraging more people to engage with the trail.

Trail Management Team (TMT):

Responsible for the "building and maintaining" aspect of the trail, they oversee trail construction and maintenance efforts. This includes coordinating volunteers, such as Section Supervisors and Trail Adopters, who ensure the trail remains accessible and well-maintained. The Trail Management team is overseen by a chairman and a committee, including a representative from each chapter.



Buckeye National Scenic Trail Feasibility Study Update

The Buckeye National Scenic Trail Feasibility Study Acts of 2021 and 2022 passed within the Omnibus Bill towards the end of that year. As the process unfolded, the National Park Service was designated to conduct the study, a team was formed out of the NPS Denver Service Center, and they began work on the study in earnest with a 3-year timeline in October of 2023. January of 2025 saw the public stakeholder input phase of the study. In person stakeholder meetings were conducted by NPS staff in the Cuyahoga Valley, Napoleon, Dayton, Cincinnati, and Athens, OH as well as a virtual public meeting totaling over 400 participants in addition to all the comments submitted online before the deadline of February 19th. Thank you all for turning out in support of the BT on relatively short notice in inclement weather on weekday evenings!

Public Engagement:

The BNST Feasibility Study Team has been in contact with the BTA, in person on January 17th at our headquarters in the Buckeye Trail Town of Shawnee, OH, as well as virtual meetings to fine tune the questions the team still must answer. The Team has solicited input from the public on these topics/ questions:

- 1. How do you use the Buckeye Trail? For example, do you have a favorite time of year to recreate on the trail? How often do you use the trail? Do you use it to commute, hike, bike, or enjoy other activities?
- 2. Do you have information you can share regarding places or amenities on or near the trail that are important to you?
- 3. How do you think proposed designation of this route as a national scenic trail would affect you and your community? Do you have concerns? What benefits do you see?
- 4. Is there anything else you want the study team to know about the Buckeye Trail route and sites associated or adjacent to it?

Information Requests:

The Team is currently requesting more information from the BTA regarding the overlay with Ohio's geology, geography, and history, our trail preservation efforts, plans, and partnerships, our vast network of partnerships, our current and future trail maintenance processes and plans, as well as the current and potential economic impact of the BT to local our local communities.

If your BTA partner organization has not yet submitted a letter of support or interest to the team at Buckeye_Trail_Study@ nps.gov it may still be accepted as part of the Feasibility Study documentation. Of note, Governor DeWine and ODNR Director Mertz, as well as Ohio Senator Steve Wilson, Co-Chair of the Ohio Legislative Trails Caucus, are among many others who have submitted enthusiastic letters of support so far.

Next Steps:

The Team has been clear that they are not providing a recommendation in favor or against the idea of a BNST, they are specifically providing the information to their superiors within the agency of the National Park Service and ultimately to the Secretary of the Interior about whether or not Ohio's BT meets the criteria of a

National Scenic Trail as defined in the National Trails System Act of 1968, as amended. The results of the process will provide a finding to Congress. That is where the study will end, likely in the Spring of 2026. A potential next step would be an effort to introduce a bill to Congress to officially designate our Buckeye Trail as the 12th National Scenic Trail based on those findings.

I will share that the Feasibility Study Team has expressed that they are impressed with the quantity and quality of input that they have received so far from BT enthusiasts like you. They have enjoyed meeting you and have high compliments for you regarding your kindness, thoughtfulness, and passion for the Buckeye!

Thank you for, as usual, being such great ambassadors of the BT and the Buckeye Trail Association!!!

- **Feasibility Study Purpose:** The Team is providing information to the National Park Service and ultimately to the Secretary of the Interior about whether or not Ohio's BT meets the criteria of a National Scenic Trail.
- Study Focus: The study aims to understand trail usage, identify important amenities, assess the impact of national scenic trail designation, and gather additional information about the Buckeye Trail route and its surroundings.
- **Study Timeline:** 'The Buckeye National Scenic 'Trail Feasibility Study began in October 2023 with a 3-year timeline, including a public stakeholder input phase in January & February 2025.
- Public Engagement: The National Park Service conducted in-person and virtual stakeholder meetings, receiving over 400 participants and numerous online comments.
- Information Request: The Team is requesting more information from the BTA regarding the overlay with Ohio's geology, geography, and history, trail preservation efforts, plans, and partnerships, trail maintenance processes and plans, and the economic impact of the BT to local communities.
- Potential Next Steps: Potentially introduce a bill to Congress to officially designate the Buckeye Trail as the 12th National Scenic Trail based on the Feasibility Study findings.

It Started with a Question

"Mommy – why does that tree have blue paint on it?" My young son, on a group hike at a local park system, pointed to a tree and then looked at me. I didn't know a lot, but I did know... "That's for the Buckeye Trail."

A while later, I purchased the

first edition of "Follow the Blue Blazes: A Guide to Hiking Ohio's Buckeye Trail," by Robert J. Pond but it wasn't until the second edition was published in 2014 (with the addition of Connie Pond as an author) that I looked at the book!

Don't make that mistake!

Whether you intend to hike the entire Buckeye Trail, or just want to learn more about the trail and hike certain sections, the information, maps, and photos in the 2014 edition will help you to appreciate what you can see and do on the trail.

Before diving into the individual chapters, a quick review of "How to Use This Guide" will help you to understand how to get the most out of the eleven geographically defined chapters as well as the chapters entitled, "Hiking the Buckeye Trail," and the final chapter which discusses the history of the trail. An index at the back of the



book enables you to quickly find specific information....very helpful if you are on the way out the door to a hike!

How to use the guide:

For a quick overview of how each geographically defined chapter is organized, I'll use the example of "Chapter 7 – The Great Black Swamp." The chapter opens with a highlighted Buckeye Trail map indicating the area the chapter will cover as well as the relevant BTA section maps. The distance, as well as Ohio counties covered, are also indicated, along with a more detailed map on the next page. The overview discusses the history, geography, and highlights of the area, and includes several color photographs. Three featured hikes are then discussed, once again including maps and photographs. The chapter concludes with a list of websites of "Local Contacts" and the Waypoint ID's along with their descriptions, latitudes, and longitudes!

Whew! A lot of information packed into one chapter! Each of the other geographically defined chapters are similar. Although many hikers use the BTA physical maps or FarOut/Avenza or other apps, the details packed into these chapters just can't be reproduced by those resources.


Information Updates:

Introducing:



My name is Anthony and I run the Native Plant Nursery for Rural Action. I have had a lifelong love for the outdoors, stemming from a passion for propagating native flora from my home state of Ohio. I started growing perennial wildflowers when I was 15 and have diversified into growing native trees, shrubs, and everything else under the sun. The goal of

Rural Action's nursery is to create a sustainable model for growing trees for the Appalachian region. The nursery team and I work with local landowners to locate native tree populations to source seed from. Currently, the seeds are collected and raised into seedlings at Rural Action's plant nursery. We are beginning to work with select local producers to grow trees for future planting projects, helping to provide economic opportunity to the region. Many of these planting projects are happening in Rural Action. Our Watersheds team has been working on restoring quite a few properties across Southeast Ohio. Many of these properties are critically important for watershed health.

Downy Service Berry (Amelanchier arborea)

One of my favorite native plants is the Downy Service Berry (Amelanchier arborea). There are quite a few Service Berry species native to the state, with the Downy being the most commonly abundant. They are small trees found growing in meadows, old agriculture fields, and forest edges. They are popularly known for producing small, flavorful plum-colored berries. In my honest opinion, they are the best-tasting native fruit in Ohio. You just have to beat the birds to them first, which is tough for the birds, also realizing just how tasty they are!



Ohio's Geauga County Maple Festival: Sweet Treats on the Buckeye Trail.

When I discovered that the Buckeye Trail passes through Chardon, Ohio, the home of the Geauga County Maple Festival, I was filled with anticipation. I was intrigued by the idea of hiking it during the festival and indulging in the delectable treats and festivities. Seeing as I grew up in Geauga County, the fondest of memories poured in. As a child, I recall the joy of attending the festival, being handed a dish of hot maple syrup and a wooden spoon, and stirring the sweet syrup until it magically turned into a creamy, golden piece of candy. I also wanted to go to the festival as a tribute to my father, whose passion was making maple syrup.

Geauga County Maple Festival:

The Geauga County Maple Festival is an annual event that celebrates the region's rich tradition of maple syrup production during the last full weekend in April. Founded in 1926, it's the oldest maple festival in the United States and one of the largest. It takes place in the picturesque Chardon Courthouse Square District. Visitors can indulge in a unique 'maple stir' at Heritage House, witness the award-winning maple syrup displays, and enjoy an array of maple products from local producers. A highlight is the pancake breakfast, served with sausages and real maple syrup. The festival also features a parade, entertainment, and crafts, making it a delightful experience for all ages.

The Plan:

After consulting the calendar and events schedule, I spread the Buckeye Trail map on the table. It's always harder to plan than you might think because you have to find parking places for the number of miles you plan to hike. If you are hiking with others, you can stage a car at the end, but we decided to go solo that day, so my brother agreed to pick us up.

We usually plan a 10-mile hike, but parking spots only gave us the option of 8 or 14 miles. I searched for different options and found a place close to the square, but I worried it would cause traffic congestion or require us to pay ten bucks for a space.

A hiking friend, Rebecca, suggested Claridon Woodlands parking. It's a short jaunt up the road to reach the Maple Highlands Trail, a scenic 21.1-mile pathway that traverses Geauga County and is part of the Buckeye Trail.



Our Adventure:

When the day arrived, we drove to the appointed parking place and headed out on the Maple Highlands Trail. As bicyclists sped by, we soon concluded that walkers were outnumbered. Still, the friendly cyclists alerted us to their approach.

Along with the trail's natural beauty and peaceful atmosphere, we passed through award-winning covered bridges, adding a touch of historical charm to the scenic route. We hiked almost three miles along the Maple Highlands Trail to reach downtown, where we passed charming historic houses and buildings before reaching the rides, booths, and more in the square.

As we made our way to the Heritage House, where they sold



maple stirs for \$2 each, I felt nostalgic. Stirring the syrup, I felt joyous to relive that childhood memory and recall my dad's lifelong pursuit of making maple syrup.

My dad began with a makeshift boiling pan when we were young and progressed to a more sophisticated production after he retired. He won many awards for Rick's Pure Maple Syrup. I cherished his delicious syrup, which retails for \$25+ per quart. Many people associate maple syrup with Vermont, but I can vouch for the highquality maple syrup produced in Geauga County, Ohio.

Not only did my dad instill the love of maple syrup, but he also taught me the joys of hiking. Back in the 80s, he and my brother section hiked the Buckeye Trail from the Northern Terminus to Akron—long before the BT was on my radar. I'm sure he'd be thrilled to know Dave and I are continuing that quest.

We observed historical signs as we wandered along the bustling square. The loudspeaker blared as an auctioneer sold maple syrup to the highest bidder. The aroma of delectable food filled the air, so we purchased lunch and ambled through tents where commercial products and crafts were for sale.

We still had miles to go, so we headed out of town, leaving the hubbub behind. The Buckeye Trail led us down sidewalks past historic houses and families reveling in the warm weather. At the edge of town, the trail reconnected with the Maple Highlands Trail and ran parallel to Route 44, a busy road. Then, the trail ducked back into the woods and continued past Tupelo Pond, forests, Big Creek, and wildflowers.

We completed a little more than planned—almost 13 miles. In retrospect, we could have parked closer—the festival is mostly confined to Chardon Square.

You could undoubtedly hike this any time of year, but the Maple Festival can provide extra enjoyment. Here are some events you might want to attend: the Sap Run, Bathtub Races, Lumberjack Competition, the Grand Parade, and other entertainment. Visit The Maple Festival for the schedule of events and shuttle services. Have a sweet hike!

Parking Options:

If you want a shorter hike, you could search for schools, churches, or gas stations and call to ask if you could park there. There is parking at #14, and you can find places to park along side streets. The festival uses a shuttle from Sheetz, so that is another option. (The festival website has information on this).

Preparation:

For convenient transportation on backpacking trips, precrush the ramen noodles and store them in a ziplock bag. You can either discard the spice packet or set it aside for a future meal. Additionally, obtain your preferred cooked salmon packet and 8 ounces of fresh spinach in a ziplock bag. You can consider acquiring personal condiments from a sub or pizza shop, or pre-measure the ingredients if you prefer.

- 1 package ramen (no spice pack)
- 1 pack cooked salmon
- 1 8oz ziplock fresh spinach
- 2 oz grated Parmesan (2 pc packets)
- 1 tsp red pepper flakes (1 pc packet)
- 1 oz olive oil (2 pc packets)

Add ramen to 1 cup boiling water. Stir until tender. Add oil, pepper flakes, salmon, stir. Add parmesan and spinach, stir to wilt spinach and enjoy.. Enjoy!


